It is an immense pleasure for me to be associated with the publication of this souvenir magazine on the occasion of the 40 years of the Mauritius Orchid Society.



President's Message:

The Orchid Society of Mauritius, 1980 – 2020



It's a great pleasure for me to recall the track record of the Orchid Society of Mauritius throughout the 40 years gone by and very happy to note that the passion for orchids has kept us going for so long.

A good start would be to try to put things in their historical perspective. In the late 60's and early 70's several young professionals (Medical Doctors botanists etc.) fresh from University in Europe came back home after having had the opportunity to visit big flower shows. Many of them had been lucky to see some orchids on display and we can imagine today what effect it would have had on them in those days, when orchids were rare and exclusive. No wonder some of them had acquired plants and started to grow them locally. One can easily imagine how after some time, the pride of successful growing would urge them to talk about it in their professional circles and among their acquaintances. In April 1979, a selective group of these fairly new orchid growers decided to organize a private meeting at the Continental Hotel, in Curepipe to show their achievements to other fellow growers and share, their joy and most probably their growing experience. Their collective enthusiasm obviously called for more similar gatherings. That private meeting happened to be the foundation stone of today's Orchid Society of Mauritius. Those present were so thrilled by the experience that they unanimously decided to have a more formal group where more people could join in and get to know and love orchids.

In August 1980, the Orchid Society of Mauritius was registered as an association of orchid growers. The Orchid Society was born. The first executive committee was presided by Dr. Abdool Majeed Khadaroo.

The other members were: Dr. France Staub (Vice-President), Ms. Axelle Lamusse (Secretary), Mrs. Chantal Leclezio (Asst. Secretary), Mr. Mustam Currimjee (Treasurer), Dr. Beekram Jhowry (Asst. Treasurer). The group started off with 30 members, all passionate about orchids.

Axelle Lamusse still remembers the day when during a visit to Maccabé forest, with Dr. Majeed Khadaroo, she suggested the idea of organizing an orchid show. We are all so grateful to her today for her brilliant idea, which could only come from someone with a vast knowledge of the flora of Mauritius and passionate about our indigenous orchids. One will remember her regular articles on the local flora, published between 1976 and 1978, in L'Express newspaper, and which was later grouped in one publication entitled 'Dans les Jardins de L'Ile Maurice'.

The first public orchid show was held in September 1980 at the Continental Hotel, in Curepipe. The Society is proud to highlight today that there has been an annual public orchid show every single year ever since.

In 1982 the society introduced a set of 20 sponsored challenge shields, to encourage and stimulate its members, who through careful management of their plants, to produce remarkable exhibits.

In 1983 Orchid Society became an affiliated member of the American Orchid Society upon a proposal from Dr. A. Majeed Khadaroo. In that same year it was decided to organize monthly members meetings and the first one was held on the 3rd May 1983, at the Continental Hotel in Curepipe, with a talk on Cattleyas delivered jointly by Dr. Philip Teckham, Dr. France Staub and Dr. A.M. Khadaroo.

On 29th March 1984 we had the visit of Mr. Bob Nicolle of Valley Orchids, Australia, well known Cymbidium breeder. In September of the same year we were privileged to have the visit of Mr. Marcel Lecoufle from France. He was on a business trip in the region and managed a week-end stop in Mauritius to attend our annual orchid show. Mr. Lecoufle gave a talk at Bonâme Hall, MSIRI, Reduit during this visit for the benefit of members of both the Orchid Society and the Royal Society of Arts and Science of Mauritius. The following year (1985) Mr. Lecoufle attended once more the annual orchid show and this time he was accompanied by his daughter, Mrs. Genevieve Bert. They brought with them a nice collection of plants in bloom which were displayed at the show, for the pleasure of one and all.

During the following years, we established contacts with other orchid societies. We used to receive the bulletins from Natal Orchid Society, South Africa and from South East Asia Orchid Society. In 1987 Orchid Society of Mauritius was twinned to Les Orchidophiles Réunies de la Belgique and they mailed to us their annual bulletin.

Monthly members meetings around table display of orchids in bloom has the mainstay of the society. As been often as it was possible there were talks, slide projections during these meetings. The slides were received by post from the Educational Section of the American Orchid Society. Members in attendance were invited to vote for the exhibit which appealed most to them and prizes were remitted to their owners. This last part of the meetings gave the opportunity to everyone to chat with their fellow members while enjoying a drink and some snacks.

The Orchid Society has had during the past 40 years 15 Presidents. Each one of them, with the generous collaboration of an executive team, has contributed to carry over the society to this day. All of them, presidents and executive members deserve our gratitude for their dedication to keep it alive and to enhance the passion for orchids. (see annexed list of OSM executives 1980-2020).

In 1985 six active founder members were granted the status of Honorary members in recognition for their commendable service for the society. By year 2010 five of them were deceased and six new deserving members were appointed Honorary Members (see annexed list of honorary members).

In 1986, on the 3rd October, the General Post-Office Philatelic Bureau of Mauritius issued a set of four stamps featuring indigenous orchids of Mauritius: 25 cents – *Cryptopus elatus*, Rs. 2.00 – *Jumellea recta*, Rs. 2.50 – *Angraecum mauritianum* and Rs. 10.00 – *Bulbophyllum longiflorum* (Synonym *Cirrhopetalum longiflorum*)

In 2005 the society celebrated its Silver Jubilee. A message of congratulation was received from the Chairperson of the affiliated committee of the American Orchid Society. The celebration was graced by the presence of the President of the Republic, as Patron of the Orchid Society of Mauritius.

In 2006 the list of awards was reviewed and the society opted for a new set of challenge trophies and the number was reduced to 12, to reward the best of each of the twelve generic groupings. We are very grateful to all those who sponsored them.

During the past fifteen years there have been many notable events. To name a few:


- November 2011 A group of 18 members attended the 20th World Orchid Show and Conference in Singapore. A very enriching experience of massive displays and attending lectures by orchid specialists.
- August 2013 launching of the Orchid Society's Web Site.
- September 2014 Another group of 16
 members attended the 21st World Orchid
 Show and Conference in Johannesburg,
 South Africa. A great opportunity to connect
 with important personalities of the orchid
 world.
- June 2017 Talk and Mini show at Domaine de Labourdonnais. The objective was to diversify the exposure to orchids regionally.
- October 2017 Introduction of a 'kids' corner' at annual show. The idea came from the American Orchid Society with the objective to create orchid awareness among the younger generation.
- October 2019 Mr. Tom Mirenda, an accredited judge and also the chairperson of the Conservation Committee of the American Orchid Society, based in Hawaii, was the chief guest at the 39th annual orchid show. He delivered several very instructive public talks during his visit. After forty years of presence and regular activities organised by the Orchid Society, it is very comforting to note that orchids have become familiar to a large number of people on the island. What used to be an exclusive and mysterious plant can now be seen in people's homes, gardens and at some nurseries. Many people who are not necessarily members of the Orchid



From a Distance



may come from two extremely remote volcanic archipelagos, on nearly completely opposite sides of our planet, but, even so, our island homes also share so very much in common. It was beyond astonishing to have the extraordinary opportunity to visit Mauritius last October and celebrate the wonders of Orchids as well as the glories of the natural world that are so vividly on display throughout your spectacular country. Since my childhood, I have held a fascination for Mauritius and was enormously thrilled when the opportunity for a visit presented itself. I am gratified to have made many lovely new friends there and hope our relationships in our increasingly globalized and digitized world will continue for decades to come.

Due to the global pandemic we are in the midst of, our 'new normal' includes various forms of 'social distancing'. While we can all see how this is necessary to save the lives of the most vulnerable among us, it is also true that the world is a far better place when we can travel, visit each other, and share our joys and passions in person. We must consider the undeniably relevant truth that both our islands' economic prosperity depends greatly on eco-tourism. My sincere hope is that we will not forget about each other due to the great distance we share between us. We, in the world of orchids and plant conservation are people of one mind, regardless of our racial, ethnic or socio-economic differences. Despite our geographic distance, we are the same!

It was immediately apparent to me, the minute I got off the plane, that Mauritius is an exceptional place with unique and amazing flora and fauna, diverse ethnic mix, fabulous climate, exquisite and impressive topography and, most importantly a gentle, loving island spirit, very similar to what we call 'Aloha' here in Hawaii.

I felt very much at home and cared-for by all the wonderful people I got to meet. The orchid show was a marvelous display of gorgeous plants expertly cultivated by superb local growers. It was an honor and a joy to be a part of the event.

Mauritius and Hawaii share the presence of the divine. The beauty of the land, the spirit of the people, evidence a type of blessing that is often lacking in other places no matter how beautiful they may be. It is said that Mauritius was created before Heaven was, so that it could be used as a model for God's own dwelling. Hawaii has similar connections to the heavens, as some of our peaks are said to be vortexes, or portals to heaven. No matter what your religious beliefs, it is impossible not to feel the loving presence of something beyond our normal senses when traversing our exquisite landscapes. It may indeed be that both our islands are sacred places where God and man may cohabit and interact, shortening the distance between Heaven and Earth.

Our island homes also share a history of Sugar Cane cultivation; a practice that, in another age, brought us great prosperity, but also, a fair amount of ecological devastation to both our islands. While it was shocking to discover how much native forest has been lost, the same is true of Hawaii Island as well. While visiting reserves such as Pétrin, and some other natural orchid populations, it is wonderful to know that so much of Mauritian (and Hawaiian) biodiversity still survives! Your outstanding Botanical Garden, as well as your superb private gardens and plant collection, also proves that it is possible to preserve many species with a minimum of care because of your individual passions, fertile soil and excellent climate. The spectacular and visually stunning new documentary: Mystic Mauritius, shows

definitively how much beauty and diversity remains! It is thrilling!

I urge you to organize, save and cultivate as many of your unique Mauritian species as possible, there, on your exceptional island oasis. Why? The coming decades may likely be a time of increased extinction due to anthropogenic factors such as climate change and continued deforestation. Let us not allow our precious orchid biodiversity to go the way of the Dodo, nor the Hawaiian Honeycreepers. I am here to help, and hopefully connect the orchid conservationists of the world to do exactly that. I intend to return to Mauritius regularly to establish orchid conservation gardens and additional reserves so that we can begin to protect and heal what is left of our distinctive and cherished orchid heritage. To this end, I look forward to closing the huge physical distance between us and seeing and working with all my great, new Mauritian friends for many years to come.



- 8. Visite aux Floralies du Tampon, Île de la Réunion en 2015



hen my wife, Rosemary, asked me to take her to the Continental Hotel, Curepipe, for the 1st public show of the Orchid Society of Mauritius in 1981, I showed some reluctance, took my Saturday newspapers, and told her that I would look after our two children in the car while she had a tour. On arrival, as women can prove convincing, she told me that the children too would like to look at the flowers. One would agree that I had no choice and could hardly refuse – then it happened – "it was love at first sight".

Indescribable, out of this world!!!

Words will never be able to express what I felt then, and still do. That's when my orchid journey started - I was mesmerized by the plants with exquisite flowers, and caught the virus immediately.

Within a few weeks they had become a part of my life, and I found myself thinking orchids, reading orchids, dreaming orchids - their beauty, diversity of colours, forms and fragrance.

I then realised I had fallen hopelessly in love and there was no cure for it... So I bid myself:

Welcome to the wonderful world of orchids.

Orchids have for long been thought to be mysterious and luxurious, but this is a myth. Of course, orchids carry an aura of mystery, but they are not difficult to grow, and need certain requirements, factors which are a must to obtain those fascinating flowers.

No other family of plants offers such a variety of magnificence, from the exquisite purity of *Phalaenopsis* blooms to the almost sensual brightness of the *Paphiopedilum*.





Certain flowers will keep for a day or two, some for several days and others a few months. A judicious choice of orchids will decorate a garden throughout the year.

My better half, and my children rightly diagnosed that my passion for orchids had gradually evolved into an obsession. My wife also noticed that whatever I did, had always something to do with orchids, and that when I surfed on the net it was mostly to visit sites dealing with orchids. She also stated that I never complained when dealing with these magical plants, although it could be tiring at time.

I joined the Orchid Society of Mauritius in 1981, and since then have tried not to miss any meeting or event. It has always been a pleasure to meet new friends, admire their beautiful plants and flowers, and discuss orchid culture.

A few years after I joined the Society, I was coopted as a member of the Executive Committee – an office which I served for practically more that 15 years. I also served as Assistant Secretary and Secretary for a very long time. Records will surely show that I have been the longest serving Secretary of the Society, and in that capacity I met people in different functions including a few Presidents of the Republic, and this has given me more experience and maturity to face all facets of life.

Serving the Society as Master of Ceremony for numerous years at many events, including the Annual Show was a real honour - Time consuming, of course, but how inspiring.

To my great astonishment, I was awarded Honorary Membership for "distinguished contribution to Orchid Culture" on 28th August 2010.

Formerly, I spent most of my spare time with Majeed Khadaroo, at times helping him dividing his plants. After enjoying a copious meal prepared by his wife, I was always leaving with a few of his divisions. A little story comes to mind – one Saturday afternoon he phoned asking me to come over to his place and spend some time with him to work on a book he was preparing on Orchid Culture, but to stop at Quatre Bornes market to get some "gato pima". It was later that I discovered that he was not allowed to eat those snacks that he enjoyed.

Here is one other anecdote: I was in a group of orchid lovers and we were supposed to walk a few kilometers through the forest starting at Plaine Champagne, (transport compliments of Mustam Currimjee) and among us was late Lady Yvette Walter who came wearing a black dress and high heels.

There have been so many functions with cocktails and barbecues at the residence of some members, for example, late Noel Brouard, Maurice Espitalier Noel, Marge Poncini, Vic Chakowa, Gérard Bax, Majeed Khadaroo, Amrita Vayid and also at Belle Vue Harel SE, compliments of Gérard Bax, and Rose Belle SE, compliments of late Sylvio Marie-Jeanne. I do hope that I have not left out some other venues.

There have been ups and downs in my orchid world – let me share three instances:

(1) a prominent doctor, (who boasted that he had been the first one to have started collecting orchids ??) whom I visited one afternoon – the following day, Police was at my door stating that I had stolen a couple of his precious plants. Of course the authorities had to leave empty handed after a thorough check;

- (2) another one concerns a new member who had just started orchid culture, who came to visit stating that he had an Intensive Care Unit for orchids at his place and that he could take care of some of my orchids which were not in very good shape. I trusted him and asked him to return my pots for which I am still waiting after practically 10 years. I also suggested that he take a few bulbs of a big plant given to me by Majeed. He took it and I am still waiting for "Reviens".
- (3) The 3rd instance is a cheat who presented lovely plants with very beautiful rare flowers, and yet, sold the same type, but very ordinary plants of the same structure. This was detected when they flowered at my place.

But love of orchids makes you tolerant and take these people in your stride. Bible quote: "Forgive them for they know not what they do".

I have met people of all the walks of life; I have also come across lots of generous people who, just like that, gave me a few plants from their collection. At this stage, some names come to my mind, for example, late Majeed Khadaroo, Paul Jauffret, Amrita Vayid, Dharmen Issari, and late Robert de Froberville of whom I should relate this anecdote –

Late Marcel Lecoufle, international figure in orchid culture, brought some of his most beautiful specimens to the 1985 Annual Show, and members were informed that they could choose whatever they liked and that payment would be effected at the end of the show. When I came back at the specified time to collect the plant of my choice, I was

flabbergasted by the price (Rs 800) and told Paul Jauffret, Mr. Lecoufle's representative, that I could not afford it, and to find somebody else who could. After a small conversation he had with someone I did not know, he introduced me to that same person, Robert de Froberville who insisted that I take the plant and that he would pay for it. He had these very touching and heartwarming words – "I know how you feel, as some time back I was very much like you, not being able to afford what I wanted; today I can do it for you". That, I believe, is philanthropy at its best.

My first contribution for the Annual Orchid Show in 1982 was an unidentified indigenous species, and also a humble *Phalaenopsis* with 2 white flowers on an inflorescence amidst a multitude of breathtaking fabulous looking flowers. But the best came when, on 29th September 2006, I won the best *Phalaenopsis* on show, as well as being awarded the Champion of the Show prize with *Phalaenopsis Vassilli*, plant carrying 52 blooms on one single spike.

Up to now, I can say that it's a world of its own, where one can get off alcohol, drugs, food and cars, but once hooked on orchids, one is *finished* and can never get off orchids.

Never !!!

Orchids are subtle, delicate, voluptuous. They are also masters of disguise as they take on the shapes, scents and colours that seduce insects which pollinate them.

Orchid culture is a fellowship in itself, relieving stress, bringing peace of mind, forging bonds of friendship, and fostering

mutual understanding and tolerance.

I would never have grown orchids, had it not been for my wife, and this enabled me to meet a fabulous group of people, orchid lovers, among whom, two friends and mentors who have always encouraged me and who have always been present for advice (I call them my orchid gurus) — one is Paul Jauffret, famous knowledgeable orchidist, and late Dr Majeed Khadaroo, a walking encyclopaedia and a reference in orchid culture, who once told me:

"If you want to be happy for a few hours, get drunk,

If you want to be happy for a few years, get married; and

If you want to be happy for ever, grow orchids."

My enriching adventures in the orchid world.



y relationship with orchids is a very long one; orchids have always been present in my life.

My family background is deeply rooted in orchids; my Great-Grandfather's book, "The Orchid Grower's Manual', published in 1894, sits proudly on the shelf in my own library. In its front cover there is a receipt for orchids he had imported from the firm of Sanders in England. My mother often told me of her grandfather's beautiful orchid collection growing in Curepipe and her memories of going around his garden. I still remember her saying to me "Les orchidées de Grand Père étaient plus jolis que pour toi, John ". It is strange how certain childhood memories are still vivid in our minds.

My own childhood was spent in Vacoas and our neighbour was Valerie Espitalier Noel. Valerie was one of the founding members of the Orchid Society of Mauritius (OSM) and she had an amazing collection of orchids in her wooden slatted orchid shade house where she grew amongst others, a huge yellow Cattleya with a red lip. At that time, she would collect "pipi" from her children and their friends to use as fertiliser on her orchids. Fertilisers have evolved since then and I have come a long way from the adage of "fertilise weakly weekly" and we now have available in Mauritius a multitude of water soluble fertilisers to use on Orchids. With my passion for automation, today I have a fully automated irrigation system with inbuilt fertigation dozer pumps which dispenses the fertilisers to the nearest part per thousand.

It was on my return to Mauritius in 1992 that I started my own orchid collection with plants from Vacherot & Lecoufle of Boissy Saint-Leger, Paris. I soon discovered 'K orchids' shop in Quatre Bornes where my first purchase was

a Vanda Robert's Delight with four huge blue flowers. Irresistible! The shop was owned by Dr Majeed Khadaroo where every Saturday I would buy an orchid and I ended up going to his house next door where he showed me his vast private collection. He would explain the ABC of orchids with particular emphasis on tying orchids firmly down. In exchange, I initiated Majeed on how to search for pictures of Orchids and find orchid articles on the internet. A long friendship developed between us and I ended up helping him with the proof reading of his booklet "Orchid Problems in Mauritius".

Very early on, Majeed suggested that if I wanted to know more about orchids I should become a member of the Orchid Society of Mauritius.

In 1996 I took my courage and phoned the secretary at the time, Gerard Bax who explained about the monthly meetings which were held at the club house of the MSIRI in Reduit. At these meetings I was warmly welcomed by the members and was able to make new friends, among them Allan Puresh who even gave me his surplus aluminium hangers, which I still use today. Now that he has restarted his collection, he wants them back! It was Allan who persuaded me to take over the job of Secretary from him. Joining the executive committee led me to meet and know lots more members; each one with his own particular passion and interest in the orchid world.

Through the monthly meetings of the OSM I learnt a lot by talking to people and my most treasured moments have been at our annual shows; my first handling of other member's plants was at the registration table under the stalwart responsibly of Gerard Bax who taught me the orchid naming classification. Then I

learnt how to look at well grown plants from the likes of Dr Agness Chakowa, who would say "look at how the plant grows along the bark and pots". The core one hundred members of the society would form a strong team to welcome the two thousand visitors during the weekend shows.

Another advantage of joining the society has been the possibility of joining overseas trips around the world. The World Orchid Conference taking place every three years is an amazing orchid show, the equivalent of the World Cup for orchids. I was lucky to be able to join the trip organised by the OSM to the World orchid show taking place in Singapore in 2011. There we would not only visit the orchid show every morning but we would also visit the world famous National Orchid Garden at the Singapore Botanical Gardens and guided by Chantal Chung and Lily Lee to the restaurants of Orchard Road in the evenings. Three years later the World Conference took place in South Africa and a group of us went over for a week. On the opening night I bumped into 'The man of big Vandas in America, Robert Fuchs, who has the stature of an American Football player and had registered Vanda Robert's Delight, my first Vanda! The next day our President Serge L'Ecluse and I had lunch with Mr. Julian M. H. Shaw, who registers Orchid hybrids with the International Registration Authority of the Royal Horticultural Society, London. We participated as delegates and went for whole day conferences given by other authorities of the orchid world like Dr Kanchit Thammasiri, of Thailand. We knew Dr Kanchit Thammasiri well as he had been our chief guest of the weeklong workshop for the OSM 25th Jubilee Anniversary in 2005. More recently, at our own last annual show in October 2019, we had the honour of having Tom Mirenda with us for a week.

Tom is an accredited judge of the American Orchid Society and we had the privilege of his guidance on our judging team. During that weekend Tom gave very interesting lectures and took the time to advise us, individually,

with extremely useful tips on orchids.

The OSM has not only brought pleasure of growing orchids and increased knowledge of plants and ecosystems but also lasting camaraderie and friendship with people outside my family and work. The orchid world is very enriching and has brought many

memorable moments to me and I would encourage others to join and participate fully in all levels of activity organised by the Orchid Society of Mauritius.

My encounter with the Orchid Society of Mauritius



I ince childhood I have loved flowers and plants and this passion, I owe it to my Godmother, Mrs Nadège Hennequin. I spent part of my school holidays in her garden at Beau Bassin and I was fascinated by the colourful blooms and fragrances. I learned about growing from seedlings and cuttings, watching the plants grow and bloom. The orchid world was unknown to me until one Saturday in September 1981 when my late loving husband, Noel, took me as a surprise treat, to an Orchid Exhibition at the Continental Hotel in Curepipe. It must have been the first Orchid Show open to the public. This was my first formal encounter with orchids plants and blooms. I was amazed: a jaw-dropping experience. I clearly remember the exotic "la caze la paille" set up background decoration where orchid plants with brilliant colourful orchids blooms hanging. I was stunned with my eyes wide open, a neophyte in this (phyto) world of orchids. I learned that all the orchids had specific names & parenting such as *Phalaenopsis*, Dendrobium, Oncidium, Cattleyas, Vanda... and all plants were labelled. And my other first encounter with an orchid plant was a cutting of Arachnis which Noel bought for me at Rs 25. That was a treat indeed. I had that Arachnis in the backyard growing and climbing on my laundry strings as support. It bloomed so generously; the long stalks of spider-like yellow blooms forming such a natural arrangement... so rewarding!

My passion for orchids grew further when I started travelling: Singapore, Thailand, Malaysia, China, Reunion and Madagascar, and in every country I would make sure I visited a flower show or a flower plantation or a flower market. I joined The Orchid Society of South East Asia of Singapore then and met orchidists, hobbyists & commercial growers.

I remember making a trip to Cameroun Highlands in Malaysia to visit an intensive cultivation of cymbidium.

For many years, it was a pleasure for me to hold the post of secretary or treasurer under the successive presidency of Dr Claude Ricaud, Renaud Lagesse & Serge L'Ecluse. Together with other members, we always have a sense of commitment to the Orchid Society for its smooth running and we are always ready to help ,especially for the setting up of the traditional annual show.

As a single parent of three children, I always insisted to taking my children along to the different functions of the Orchid Society, such as various talks & mini shows, the annual dinner and the annual show. I knew they were not too keen to follow me thinking that this hobby was for adults only. Recently the Society decided to implement a new idea - a Kids Corner in the Orchid Show. I was glad to be part of this project. It was a good initiative to get children closer to the orchids as I did to my own children. Today my children are adults and thank me for initiating them to the world of orchids.

I lovingly keep the nice memories of our overseas

This keeps me in the orchid loop and chasing after the specific orchid stamps issued by countries worldwide. This is a very satisfying hobby and leads to discovering new orchid species as well as making friends with others sharing the same passion. I thank our OSM members who, during these two months of confinement due to the Covid-19 outbreak, generously share online their orchids blooms. They definitely bring colours and positive vibes to our days at home. I thank Serge L'Ecluse, our President for his valuable leadership in OSM, encouraging and bringing out every person's valuable contribution to the Orchid Society of Mauritius. Les balades en forêt toujours instructives et qui m'ont rendu doublement passionné de nos espèces locales.





My 'brief' History of Time with the Orchid Society of Mauritius



came back to live in Mauritius in 1984, 4 years after the foundation of the Orchid Society of Mauritius. I was an avid orchid enthusiast and quickly joined the infant Society. In those days, the monthly meetings were held at the Continent Hotel in the Currimjee Arcades in Curepipe. Most of the founder members were active; we had our Annual Show at the end of September every year. We found out that attendance at the monthly meetings was low. But we soon discovered that sporadic informal Mini Shows at some members' homes, like at the Poncini's in Floréal, the Espitalier-Noel at Bagatelle, and Jean Brouard in Péreybère were extremely popular. Everybody came to these very social evenings which however meant a lot of work for the hosts.

If my memory does not fail me, the very first OSM founder member I met was Dr. AMK as he was known, and Majeed to the members. His knowledge was encyclopedic and I never ever managed to catch him off guard about orchids. We became good friends and he taught me a lot about orchids. We got into the habit of having lunch once a month for about 25 years until two weeks before his death around his 90th birthday. Dr. Khadaroo was officially a dentist, but practiced mainly orchid-growing. You could go to his home, rue Bernardin de Saint Pierre in Quatre-Bornes at any time and you would find him in his orchid-crowded shade houses. He had encountered orchids years before and it was love at first sight for him. His orchids knew it and rewarded him by growing and flowering profusely... Majeed was a pillar of the OSM and many of the committee's meetings were held at his home. He single-handedly won the most prizes of all members and will remain a legendary figure in OSM.

Of the founder members, the one I found the most amusing was Dr. France Staub, another dentist turned orchid lover. He was always laughing and had the only 'inverted' laugh I ever encountered. He would inhale whilst laughing. Those who knew him will always remember it.

I might be wrong, but I think that the longestserving member still active today is our dearest Serge L'Ecluse. He is the most stable and serious orchid lover I have known. Serge is the last supporting pillar left from the old guard. He joined the OSM two years before me, so I have always known him associated with the OSM.

Of the most endearing, dedicated members of that time, I remember fondly Marc de Coriolis who grew stunning specimen plants, Francis Montocchio with his fantastic sense of humour and devotion to the OSM, Paulo Jauffret and his most useful contact with Marcel Lecoufle and his daughter Geneviève. Paulo organized, for the Orchid Society members, several importations of orchid plants from Marcel Lecoufle. Often

the plants would arrive just before the annual show. Someone even managed to win a prize with a 'just imported' Marcel Lecoufle plant to my horror. The feeling in those days was that members genuinely loved orchids for their beauty and rareness and were totally dedicated to them. And their orchids rewarded them.

My own feeling about orchids is that they are like our good wives: they hate when you neglect them, they hate competition and do not tolerate you're having mistresses. If you are willing to play along these rules, they will do fine. But, if like me, you would like to have innumerable mistresses in the horticultural world, then you will unfailingly get into big trouble. And that is exactly what happened to me in my orchid world.

he flora of Mauritius has a high level of diversity and endemism due to the island's location, age, isolation and varied topography. Mauritius has been identified as a Centre of Plant Diversity by The International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN - www. iucn.org) and the Mascarenes (Mauritius, Réunion Island and Rodrigues) have been included in the Madagascar and Indian Ocean islands biodiversity hotspot.

The status of the flora is as follows:

- The extent of reasonable quality native forest (i.e. that with more than 50% native plant canopy cover) is currently estimated at around 2,600 ha.
- 15 vegetation types (based on vegetation structure and physiognomy) have been classified, ranging from marsh communities to scrub associations to forest communities
- 691 species of indigenous flowering plant have been recorded in Mauritius, of which 273 are endemic, and 150 endemic to the Mascarenes Archipelago
- 89 % of the Mauritius endemic flora is considered threatened (Mauritius has one of the most threatened island floras in the world). 61 of the country's indigenous species are already classified as extinct. 141 of the flowering Mascarene endemic plant species are classified as Critically Endangered (89 taxa are represented by 10 or fewer known individuals in the wild and 5 taxa are represented by only a single known individual), 55 species are Endangered and 98 are classified as Vulnerable
- There are about 200 species, subspecies and varieties of pteridophytes, of which 13 species are endemic, and 40 are extinct.

• There are 207 taxa lower plants consisting of 89 genera of mosses and 59 genera of hepatics.

The flora unit at NPCS is responsible for the conservation and management of the native flora.

History of native flora in Mauritius

When Mauritius was first visited in the 17th century, it was covered by dense vegetation. Following colonization, the forests of Mauritius have been cleared for agriculture, forestry, villages and towns, and other developments. Today good quality native forests occupy less than 2.0 % of our total area. These forests are found on mountain ridges, on the Offshore Islets and in Black River Gorges and Bras D' Eau National Parks. These forest remnants provide the last habitats for our endemic flora and fauna.




Figure 1: Vegetation of Mauritius (Source: Vaughan & Wiehe, 1937 and Cheke, 1987)

Our remaining native forests are under constant threat of alien invasive plants such as Chinese guava (Psidium cattleianum), privet (Ligustrum robustum subsp. walkeri) and ravenale (Ravenala madagascariensis). These exotic plants compete with the native species for space, light and nutrients. Introduced animals also contribute significantly to the degradation process either by physically damaging the plants or helping in the dispersion of the seeds of the exotic plants. Herbivorous mammals such as the rusa deer (Cervus timorensis) and the hare (Lepus nigricollis) browse young plants and tender shoots. Monkeys (Macaca fascicularis) selectively destroy flowers and fruits as well as foliage, wild pigs (Sus scrofa) cause extensive damage by roots of plants and disturbing the soil, and rats eat the ripe fruit. Red whiskered bulbul and wild pigs disperse the seeds of the Chinese guava.

Ex-situ conservation of native orchids of Mauritius

The Native Plant Propagation Centre (NPPC) is the main *ex situ* facility for National Parks & Conservation Service (NPCS) for the conservation of the native flora of Mauritius. It has been set up in 1996 at Robinson Road, Curepipe to provide necessary facilities for the propagation of threatened native plant species, ferns, and orchids together with a collection of native plants in an arboretum. It comprises of the following amenities:-

Green House

The greenhouse is a structure covered with glass that allows sufficient sunlight to enter for the purpose of growing plants. At NPPC the greenhouse consists of three departments namely preparation room, mist chamber & weaning chamber. Propagation of threatened plants is carried out both sexually by seeds and vegetatively by cuttings, spores and

bulbils using specific techniques. During the past, native orchids had been successfully propagated and which include some of the most endangered species such as *Phaius villosus*, *Corymborkis corymbis*, *Bulbophyllum densum*, *Hederorkis scandens*, *Angraecum baideri*, *Beclardia macrostachya* and *Jumellea recurva*.

Fern and Orchid Collection




Figure 5: Endangered orchid species propagated at Native Plant Propagation Centre (A: Angraecum baideri; B: Angraecum cadetii; C: Cryptopus elatus; D: Phaius villosus; E: Angraecum eburneum; F: Beclardia macrostachya




Figure 6: Endangered orchid species propagated at Native Plant Propagation Centre (G: Benthamia chlorantha;H: Oeoceoclades maculata; I: Bulbophyllum densum; J: Oeoniella polystachys; K: Jumellea exilis; L: Platylepis occulta

The fernery unit comprises of a fern laboratory & a collection of several species of pteridophytes & orchid species. Propagation of ferns are carried out in the fern lab through spores & bulbils. The project was initiated through the Darwin Initiative Project in 1997. Up to now, a total of 50 species of pteridophytes and 44 orchid species exist in the collection (Fig 5 & 6). A variety of indigenous species including the most threatened endemic are being successfully propagated at NPPC for the safeguard of viable population in the wild.

Robinson Arboretum

As part of the World Environment Day 2018, Robinson Arboretum of the National Parks and Conservation Service of the Ministry of Agro Industry and Food Security, a reserve in Curepipe, was inaugurated on 05 June 2018 by the Minister of Agro Industry and Food Security. It is an area of 5.5 ha which has been earmarked for the development of the extension of the arboretum for the collection of most of the native flowering plant species of Mauritius. The Arboretum is an important tool for conservation education and awareness. It also serves as a field gene bank covering an area of about 3.0 hectare. This site harbours some 597 rare native plants (including orchids) of 160 species. This area is provided with a well laid brick footpath and a kiosk to provide a peaceful environment for any visitors enjoying the beauty of some of the rarest native flora.

Darwin Initiative funded Seed Bank Project

The storage of material in the form of seeds is one of the most widespread and valuable *ex situ* approaches to conservation. Seed banking exploits the natural dormancy mechanism of seeds. Seed banking has considerable advantages over other methods of *ex situ* conservation such as ease of storage, economy of space, relatively low labour demands and consequently, the capacity to maintain large samples at an economically viable cost.

The seed bank was established in July 2006 at Robinson Road, Curepipe, as part of collaboration between Millennium Seed Bank RBG Kew, National Parks and Conservation Service and the Mauritius Herbarium. Collections and running of the Seed Bank facility started in March 2007. Since the establishment of the seed bank centre, 286 species have been successfully banked up to now. In the future, seeds of more native orchids will be collected and stored at the NPPC.
